

OVERVIEW

The Visiting Clerkship Program provides support for fourth-year and qualified third-year minority (African-American, Hispanic/Latino and American Indian/Alaska Native) medical students to participate in the Harvard Medical School Exchange Clerkship Program. It was designed to:

- Increase awareness of opportunities in academic medicine
- Increase consideration of academic training programs for internship and residency
- Increase the number of minority students applying to HMS-affiliated hospital training programs

The Visiting Clerkship Program is sponsored by the Minority Faculty Development Program of the Harvard Medical School Office for Diversity Inclusion and Community Partnership.

PROGRAM DETAILS

Eligibility

Eligible participants are: full-time, fourth-year medical students in good standing at accredited US and Canadian medical schools. Third-year students who have completed their core clerkships in medicine, surgery, pediatrics, and obstetrics are also eligible. In addition to completion of core requirements, all students applying to the VCP must have completed USMLE Step 1 prior to the start of their rotation.

Students remain registered at their own schools while participating in exchange clerkships at Harvard Medical School. They are not officially enrolled as students at Harvard University.

Length

Clerkships last four weeks and are offered year-round.

Mentoring and Networking

VCP participants are assigned a faculty advisor and offered opportunities to network with HMS faculty, house staff and students. A dinner/luncheon meeting for faculty and students is held during each rotation.

Course Offerings

Visiting Clerkship Program participants can take elective courses at Harvard Medical School. Please view electives in the online catalog: www.medcatalog.harvard.edu

In addition, participants have access to the Harvard Medical School Countway Library, hospital seminars, and hospital workshops.

Financial Assistance

The program will:

- reimburse up to \$400 toward the cost of traveling to and from Boston;
- pay the application processing fee required by HMS Registrar's Office.

Housing

The Visiting Clerkship Program provides housing for participating students.

APPLICATION

To receive a VCP application, please return the Application Request Form on the back of this brochure or call the Visiting Clerkship office at 617-432-4422; email: vcp_hpsp@hms.harvard.edu. We will send you the forms that are required for VCP application.

In order to complete HMS exchange clerkship application you need to go online at the registrar's website at www.hms.harvard.edu/registrar and enter your clerkship preferences and your preferred month. You can then return the requested forms along with VCP application to the VCP office. We will forward all information to the registrar's office. The registrar's office will contact you with your assigned clerkship.

DEADLINES

You must enter the online application at the registrar's website at least 3 months before the desired rotation but no earlier than 6 months before the rotation. In order to be competitive for a clerkship, it is best to submit your VCP application as well as online application before the 3 month deadline. Then follow up by sending all requested materials to the VCP office. Again, for application information, please call 617-432-4422. The HMS registrar's office strictly enforces application deadlines.

ABOUT THE OFFICE FOR DIVERSITY INCLUSION AND COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP AND THE MINORITY FACULTY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Minority Faculty Development Program (MFDP) in the Office for Diversity Inclusion and Community Partnership (DICP) was created by the Harvard Medical School Faculty Council in 1990 to support the career development of junior faculty and to address the following crucial pipeline issues:

- Increasing the pool of minority students interested in careers in science and medicine
- Promoting medical students, graduate students, and fellows to develop the needed skills for success in the academic arena
- Advancing the career development of junior faculty

The Office for Diversity Inclusion and Community Partnership was established in 2002 to promote the increased recruitment, retention and advancement of diverse faculty, particularly individuals from groups underrepresented in medicine (URM), at HMS and to oversee all diversity activities involving Harvard Medical School (HMS) faculty, trainees, students and staff.

Our pipeline programs begin as early as the middle school level and carry on through the postgraduate level and involve curriculum development, teacher training, enhancing student research, and career development. DICP/MFDP's work addresses HMS' relationship with the community (internal and external) through the provision of programs that link HMS faculty, trainees and students with local, regional and national community-related activities.
